 - i. Resolution #4613 was adopted for discussion

 - 1. The bill is pretty self-explanatory. The Sioux Treaty of 1868 established for the land of the people and then was later diced off and sold. This is not a political issue. This is an environmental and social issue.

- 1. Associate Senator Syron: Why are we not voting on this?
 - a. This needs to have one reading, go to committee, be read again, and then voted on.
- 2. Senator Martin: Would you be ok if this does go back to committee?

- a. I did contact the NACC Office during the writing of the bill. We were supposed to set up a meeting time but was never accomplished.
- 3. Senator Brown: How does this passage of legislation would conflict areas of the student body?
 - a. I wrote it to the violence of the protestors. I did not aim for this. I did not consider this aspect while writing the legislation.
- 4. Senator Royer: What would our support look like?
 - a. This is basically a statement for support.
- 5. Senator Holohan: Do you think that this is jurisdiction of the student senate?
 - a. I think it is a student issue. We had students on the plaza asking for a motive of action. I think it is a call for both the students and the local level.
- 6. Senator Pyfrom: What about the students at CSU that are in favor of the pipeline?
 - a. This legislation isn't against the pipeline but is against the action taken on the pipeline.
- 7. Senator Stott: Do you think it is the role of ASCSU to take a political stance? What would be repercussions?
 - a. This is part of the college experience. It doesn't necessarily do anything but does state our support. It is not a duty to take a political stance. It is our job to announce our feelings.
- 8. Senator Horowitz: There have been specific students that have spoken out in support the pipeline. How does that affect them?
 - a. It doesn't go against the pipeline. It goes against going through the native lands and the actions against the protestors.
- 9. Senator Pastor: If we were to pass this, would we be sending an announcement to the protestors or to the student body?
 - a. I hope that we could send this to them.
- 10. Senator Brown: Do you believe that this is different than taking stances on other political issues?

a. Each issue is different in itself. This issue is different for its historical context and law.
