ABSTRACT:

This proposed bill seeks to allocate \$10,000 from the Senate Discretionary Budget to El Centro. These funds will enable El Centro to purchase Serape and Central/South American and Caribbean stoles for their graduation ceremony. Additionally, an extra \$4000 will be allocated and evenly distributed to NACC, APACC, B/AACC, and Pride for their graduation ceremonies.

WHEREAS

At present, Hispanic/Latino students form the largest demographic group at Colorado State

University, apart from white students. In fall 2023, around 4,073 students identified as Hispanic/Latino, with this figure continuing to grow; and,

WHEREAS

Every year, El Centro hosts the SOMOS Graduation event, costing \$22,629.23. This event needs 350 serape stoles at \$24 each, and around 40 Central/South American and Caribbean stoles, for a total of \$10,673.90; and,

WHEREAS

El Centro's budget is \$321,218, with the majority going to staff compensation. This leaves \$13,358 for operating costs, including phone and computer lab expenses, and cultural programs like National Latinx/é Heritage Month and Latinx/é Activism Week, thereby limiting the financial backing for the SOMOS graduation ceremony; and,

WHEREAS

El Centro has historically lacked stable funding to support initiatives like Graduation Stoles. The past ceremonies and stoles relied on various funding sources, such as small donations and contributions from attendees; and,

WHEREAS

We aim to refrain from requesting funding from attendees, as many refrain from not attending these events due to financial barriers of their own; and,

WHEREAS

The purpose of funding the stoles aims to empower the growing Hispanic/Latinx graduating student population, recognizing the profound historical and national significance of the tradition of presenting "Serape-style" stoles to graduates. This tradition, embraced by the Chicano movement, serves as a means for students to express pride in their culture, honor their families' sacrifices, and connect with their ancestors; and,

WHEREAS

In 2020, El Centro introduced the Central/South American and Caribbean stoles for graduates in response to students from these regions seeking a graduation symbol reflecting transnational experiences, the broader Latinx/é diaspora, and a contemporary understanding of Latinidad; and,

WHEREAS

The Sarape stoles will be sourced from a Black, Indigenous, Person of Color (BIPOC)-owned business to promote cultural authenticity and representation, ensuring that the stoles reflect the heritage of the graduating students; and,

WHEREAS

the Central/South American and Caribbean stoles will be sourced from an artist in Guatemala, through a fair-trade agreement with a Latina-owned vendor. This ensures fair compensation for the artisans and helps El Centro navigate post-COVID inflationary pressures affecting the vendor and local weavers.

THEREFORE BE IT HEREBY ENACTED

That the Senate Discretionary Fund allocates \$10,000 to El Centro and \$1,000 for each NACC, APACC, B/AACC, and the Pride Center, for a total of \$14,000: and,

THEREFORE BE IT HEREBY FURTHER ENACTED

The Cultural Resource Center will use these funds to help fund their graduation ceremonies to host or buy items for their graduation events.

THEREFORE BE IT HEREBY FURTHER ENACTED

If the total funds allocated are not used up by June 30, 2024, the remainder returns to the Senate Discretionary Fund; so,

THEREFORE BE IT HEREBY FURTHER ENACTED

That this fund will not be added to the Cultural Center's current fund but shall be a separate fund that does not deduct from financial aid to use.

THEREFORE BE IT HEREBY FURTHER ENACTED
